CHAPTER I MULTI HAZARD DISASTER MANAGEMENT PLAN

1.1 Introduction:

A disaster is an event that causes the sudden disruption to the normal life of a society and causes damage to property and lives, to such an extent that normal social and economic mechanisms available to the society are inadequate to restore normalcy. Preparedness for natural disaster alleviates human misery. Though no amount of preparedness is enough, an attempt is made through this plan to negotiate with all the probable hazards in the district and their aftermath.

1.2 Why DDMP?

Vulnerability of the Golaghat District towards disasters, both natural and man-made is widely recognized. The district is vulnerable towards natural disasters like; Earthquakes, floods, storms, droughts and manmade disasters like fire, riot etc. Losses caused by disasters continue to mount year after year. The need for an effective disaster management strategy to lessen disaster impact is being felt in many quarters and also for strengthening of organizational structure for disaster management. Along with, regular updating of Codes/Manual/Disaster Plans on the basis of experience gained and technological developments should be done.

It was felt that the generic categorization of disasters would help in preparing disaster management plans. This generic categorization of disasters is in no way intended to disturb handling of specific disasters by various departments.

Precise actions, procedures and responsibilities have to be laid down well in advance in order to ensure timely response in case of any disaster. Therefore, a mechanism that takes into account multiple hazards and basic preparedness has to be articulated in the form of Incident Response Team, Quick Response Teams, Quick Assessment Teams, Reporting Procedures, Checklist and Handbooks. The mechanism also lays down crucial parameters, requirements and organizational composition of Emergency Operations Centers and Incident Response Systems.

1.3 Objective:

The objectives behind the preparation of the District Disaster Management Plan is-

- ✚ To mitigate impact of natural and man-made disasters through preparedness at District, Circle, Block, Gram Panchayat and Village level.
- ✚ To provide effective support and resources to all the concerned individuals, groups and departments during disaster.
- ✚ To identify all common elements of response.
- ✚ To assist the line departments, block administration, communities in developing compatible skills for disaster preparedness and management.
- ✚ To disseminate factual information in a timely, accurate and tactful manner while maintaining necessary confidentiality.
- ✚ To develop immediate and long-term support plans for vulnerable people in/during disasters.
- ✚ To create awareness among the people about hazard occurrence and increase their participation in preparedness, prevention, development, relief, rehabilitation and reconstruction process.
- ✚ To have response system in place to face any eventuality.
- ✚ To affect or elicit the least possible disruption to the normal life process when dealing with individuals in disaster.

- ✚ To identify the available resources including manpower, material, equipment and adequate delegation of financial and administrative powers for successful operation of the DDMP.
- ✚ To ensure active participation by the government administration, communities, NGOs, CBOs and volunteers at all levels making optimal utilization of human and material resources at the time of disaster.

1.5 Vision

The Golaghat district experiences several natural and manmade disasters like flood, storm, riot etc. periodically at regular intervals. The devastation caused by floods and storms has posed a challenge before the administration to rethink and redefine the preparedness and the mitigation strategies to analyse each and every decision making process to gear up the rescue and restoration during such situations as well as building up the capacity to face further calamities in future. The District Administration has realized the necessity to compile a plan to prevent/minimize the loss and also to facilitate faster recovery during an emergency of this kind. This booklet is more of a guidebook, which can help the Administration and Departments, to remain better prepared for flood, storms etc. to safeguard lives, livelihoods and property.

In broadest terms, the vision of the plan will be effective communication, authentic and accurate database, documented and rehearsed to be activated in the shortest possible time with minimum simple orders and procedures ensuring active participation by the administration, community and volunteers at all levels, making optimal utilization of human and material resources with no gaps or no overlaps to prevent/minimize loss to lives and property and to ensure fastest restoration of the situation.

The river Brahmaputra is in the North, Nagaland is in the South, Kokadonga River and Jorhat District are in the East and Karbi Anglong is located in the West of this district. Dhansiri, a tributary of river Brahmaputra and the River Brahmaputra are the main rivers of the District. Other rivers and rivulet flowing in the Sub Division are Doyang, Kakodonga, Doigrung, Mokrong, and Gelabeel.

RIVER NETWORK IN GOLAGHAT DISTRICT :-

The River Brahmaputra flowing in east-west direction in the extreme northern parts of the district and its tributaries flowing in northerly direction, control the entire drainage system of the district and plays an important role in occurrence of flood and erosion in the district. The Dhansiri is the main river of Golaghat District of Assam. It originates from Laisang peak of Nagaland and flows through a distance of 352 km from south to north before joining the Brahmaputra on its south bank. Its total catchment area is 1220 km². The river has meandering courses with abandoned channels in the form of bils and ox-bow lakes along their courses. All other tributaries like Doyang, Kakodonga, Ghiladhari, Gelabeel etc. originates from the Naga Hills and finally outfalls into the river Brahmaputra. In addition to this, there are large numbers of small rivulets/channels also join the tributaries creating a big river network in the districts. Except the river Brahmaputra, all other rivers emanating from Naga Hills are very flashy in nature and have the potential to cause serious flood havoc in the districts.

3.3 EMBANKMENT SYSTEMS UNDER GOLAGHAT DISTRICT:-

At present the Golaghat W. R. Division has 150.475 km of embankments on major rivers in Golaghat district. All these embankments were originally constructed in between 1952 to 1957. Construction of these embankments has given reasonable flood protection to about 44,527 Ha in Golaghat district. Category wise lengths of embankments so far constructed are shown below:

FLOOD AND EROSION IN GOLAGHAT DISTRICT:-

Annual flooding is a perennial problem of golaghat district. The average annual rainfall in the district is 2,012 mm. About 60 to 65% of the annual precipitation is received during south-west monsoon from June to September. During this period floods occurs due to spilling of river bank and inundates many areas in the district. The total flood affected areas of the district in last five years along with area inundated during the 2007 and 2012 floods in June is shown below. River bank erosion is also major issue in Golaghat district. The severely erosion affected reaches are Bonkawal area, Negheriting Rongagora area, Dhansiri mukh area, Agaratoli and Arimora area of Kaziranga National Park. In addition to this, almost entire reach of the river Dhansiri is affected by erosion

4.3.1 Flood:

During rainy seasons, all the major rivers in the district carry gallons of water pose potential threat of flood. The heavy rainfall in the catchment areas of the district causes the rising of water level above the danger level.

Golaghat District had experience devastating flood during 2018 in three phases.

The highest recorded water level of river Dhansiri at Numaligarh is 80.15 m (D.L- 78.42 m) on 03.08.2018 and the water level of Brahmaputra River: 77.12m (DL 75.00m) on 12-07-2020

The river Doyang and Dhansiri flooded due to release of excess water from DHEP, NEEPCO Dam. The huge inflow of water caused landslide at upper reaches of Doyang and subsequently caused flood and erosion.

4.3.3 Factors for flood Death

- ❖ Most of the local Community members earn their livelihood by means of fishing. This is a major reason of flood drowning as the river becomes flooded and the normal water course is disrupted.
- ❖ The community use handmade country boats which is not technically sound and fit in terms of balancing and load capacity. During flood they use these local country boats for transportation, carrying goods, cattle and due to overload the boats capsize and drowning incident occur.
- ❖ The local communities have the habit of swimming and bathing in rivers which specially pose threat to the children during high flood situation.
- ❖ In some cases at the tea garden areas and tribal areas drowning incidents are caused due to the person's drunken state.
- ❖ People do not use life saving kits such as life jackets, life buoys, floating aids during movement in flood water.
- ❖ During flood the power supply is cut by the APDCL department. Therefore, in dark hours movement of persons at flood affected areas cause drowning incidents.
- ❖ In some cases the parents leave their children at home and taking advantage of the freedom the children play in the rivers which invite drowning cases.
- ❖ There are reports of drowning cases due to suicide attempt jumping into rivers or criminal acts which lead to drowning. These cases remain untraced and doubtful.

4.3.4 Measures taken by DDMA to prevent flood Death

- ❖ Awareness programmes at village level involving key departments, community members and volunteers.
- ❖ Training to AAPDA MITRA/ volunteers for basic search and rescue operations.
- ❖ Early warning dissemination of weather forecast, water level, through whatsapp groups involving departments, NGOs, Field Officers, Circle staff, Pratirodhi Bondhu volunteers, PRI members , Gaon Burahs.
- ❖ Public announcements at villages and public alert through DIPRO. Miking through Gaon pradhan (village head) at flood vulnerable villages during rise of Water level.
- ❖ The District Administration had meeting with NEEPCO, Doyang Authority and also had regular communication through Whatsapp group and advised to regulate release of water from the Dam in advance to prevent high discharge of water which may cause devastation at the downstream villages.
- ❖ Disseminating Flood advisory for students through BEEOs, School Focal Point Teachers and Heads of Institutions.
- ❖ Manual siren distributed among flood vulnerable villages across Doyang river to the village headmen.
- ❖ Coordinating with Inland Water Transport department for safe plying of vessels and ensuring safety measures to prevent incidents.
- ❖ Regular monitoring of River Water Level and coordinating with NDRF and SDRF teams for readiness and prompt response. Also, constant touch with village level volunteers, Pratirodhi Bondhu volunteers and Field staff to be alert to prevent any eventuality.

4.3.5 Storm, hailstorm

Golaghat district is highly vulnerable to storm. Storms generally bring in their trail heavy rains with hailstones causing damage to property and crops.

4.3.6 Fire Incidents:

Fire accidents present a serious problem to the houses and the market places in Golaghat district. This is mostly due to the leakage of LPG gas or short circuit due to poor electrification. Any occurrence of fire destroys houses and properties thereby causing serious damage to the affected people. Transportation of LPG, Petrol, diesel and other inflammable commodities through National Highway 37 and 39 has a greater potential for any fire incidents. Apart from this, the existence of Numaligarh Refinery Limited (NRL) and oil and gas pipeline of ONGC, AGC has also increased the probability of fire accidents.

4.3.7 Earth Quake:

The entire North-East region is in the seismic zone V, i.e. probability of happening of earthquake more than 8 magnitudes in Richter scale. Though Golaghat district has not experienced any major earthquake in recent past causing damage to lives or infrastructure, the possibility can never be ruled out as it can happen any time.

4.3.8 Disaster Situation:

Human and Animal Conflict: The Human-Elephant and Human-Monkey conflict is an indispensable issue for the district. This has been consistent and threat to life and property is experienced every year. The man elephant conflict is seen in the forest fringe villages under Morongi Revenue Cricle and Bokakhat Revenue Cricle. The man- monkey conflict is mostly seen under Dergaon and Golaghat Revenue Cricle.

4.4. Embankments, Roads & Bridges likely to be affected:

If the protecting embankments are breached or overtopped by rising waters in the rivers/ streams concerned; flash floods occur leaving the affected people very little time to escape. The vulnerable stretches of the various embankments in Golaghat District have been identified by the Water Resources Department (Bokakhat Sub-Division) as follows:

7.8 Irrigation Department:

As per concern of the Irrigation Department, areas near Flow Irrigation Schemes and Lift Irrigation Scheme are most vulnerable to flood hazard. The Flow Irrigation schemes under the Division are Meranodi FIS, Sisupani FIS and Rengma FIS. Since the South Development Block, Sarupathar and Gamariguri Development Block are situated in higher altitudes as compared to the other blocks, the hazard risk for the schemes situated in these blocks are low. However, it may be exposed to flash floods due to heavy rainfall in the adjacent Naga Hills and Karbi Hills.

The existing LIS scheme from Bendit Pathar (3 Points) is highly vulnerable to erosion. During floods, the area is affected by high discharge of river water during the monsoon season as well as the release of water from the Doyang Hydropower Project. The water from the Doyang River impacts the riverbank leading to significant erosion near the three points.

7.9 Impact of Disaster in Soil Conservation Departmental Activities.

Due to flood, erosion, landslides may affect many of departmental activities. Due to flood, the gully control project will be affected by breaking the guide bund.During flood the major impacts are death of plants in a forest or cash crops and damage of seedling in nursery, silt deposition in a forest area erosion in reverine land, silt deposition in drainage channel, breach in agricultural field bund and damages in boulder pitching or boulder revetment work.

7.14 Kaziranga National Park

Hazards within Kaziranga Tiger Reserve (KTR) encompassing Golaghat District:

Over the last one hundred years, major conservation successes have been seen in Kaziranga, with populations of many threatened species rising dramatically. However, threats and hazards in the protected area remain, with the increased frequency and severity of flooding, erosion, and human-wildlife conflicts. Meanwhile, anthropogenic hazards such as pipeline accidents leading to oil spills, roadkill, and threats arising from developmental activities such as pollution and habitat loss remain at large. The threats and hazards can be sub-categorised as weather and climate-induced, caused by atmospheric processes; geological hazards originating from solid earth; biological hazards caused by wildlife exposure to foreign germs and toxic substances; and anthropogenic hazards triggered by human intervention.

Hazards within KTR

1 Floods:

Flooding is crucial to the survival of the KTR ecosystem because of its role in regeneration of grasslands and cannot be considered as a threat. The animals migrate to the hills of Karbi Anglong during the floods. The safe passage and refuge of migrating animals to the elevated lands would reduce and remove any threat faced by the wildlife. However, the animals face vehicular traffic during the flooding season, leading to roadkill. Developmental activities in the elevated lands and the ever-expanding human habitations in the animal migrating areas often lead to conflicts between humans and animals. Furthermore, the receding stages of floods lead to erosion along the bankline, and deposition of silt in the wetlands. Therefore, even though floods serve as a crucial process for Kaziranga Tiger Reserve, it leads to several causally connected hazards or series relationships between erosion, human-wildlife conflict, and roadkill.

Areas around Hatikhuli, Difalupather, Tamulipather, and parts of Bagori within Golaghat particularly show very high vulnerability to floods. Whereas Kohora and majority of KTR within Golaghat district shows moderate to high vulnerability. High water inflow from Dhansiri, Difalu, Bhengrai and Debeswari nala, followed by overtopping of Moradifalu, Difalu, Dhansiri River causes extensive flooding in Kaziranga Tiger Reserve.

2 Erosion:

The northern bank of Golaghat is particularly vulnerable to bankline erosion due to the braided Brahmaputra river, its tendency to move southwards, and its ever-migrating channels. The receding stages of floods lead to the loss of large tracts of land, leading to habitat loss. Although the accretion in KTR area in Golaghat exceeds erosion, the deposited areas are sandbars formed due to accumulation of sand and these areas remain largely uninhabitable, while the habitable tracts are eroded away. Within KTR-Golaghat 20.39 sq km was eroded while 22.49 sq km. was deposited in the years 2014-2024 leading to an increase in land mass by 2.10 sq km including uninhabitable sandbars

3 Human-Wildlife Conflict

During disasters such as floods, the number of human-wildlife conflict cases rises invariably. Rising human population, intensified land-use and developmental activities, modification of natural resources, and habitat fragmentation near protected areas, among others, increase the chances of man-animal conflict . During floods many wild animals make their way out into the open area across NH-715 in search of food and safety in highland areas. Most often, wild animals of this kind are struck and killed by cars and other vehicles while crossing the NH-715 on their way to the southernmost parts of the park. Even in the fringe areas of the park, where elephants are known to go out into human-lived areas and agricultural areas in search of food, reports of human-elephant conflict are frequently seen, often resulting in the death of the animals in the encounters.

Livestock depredation by tigers is mostly during floods, while depredation by leopards mostly occurs during the December to March as they find suitable habitats in the tea garden areas in the fringes of KTR. Agricultural area in the buffer of KTR at around 215.84 sq km provides suitable food and fodder to elephants, while the developmental activities are depicted by the amount of built-up area around 19.27 sq. km increasing the chances of conflict in these areas.

4 Lightning

Within Kaziranga Tiger Reserve, lightning density is the highest during pre-monsoon (March, April, and May), followed by post-monsoon season (September, October, and November). April has the highest lightning incidents followed by September. However, lightning density has seen a statistically significant increasing trend in the monsoon season (June, July, and August), while pre-monsoon and post-monsoon saw a significant decrease. Floodplains of KTR have seen higher lightning density over a smaller area, whereas the hills used for temporary refuge do not have as high lightning density but the area of lightning distribution is much larger.

Although there are no recorded fatalities within KTR due to lightning strikes, climate change and increasing temperatures could lead to greater risk among larger mammals such as elephants. The forest officials are also vulnerable during lightning and thunderstorm events.

4.5. Erosion

4.6 Chemical and Industrial Disaster

The Numaligarh refinery Limited is located at Ponkagrang, numaligarh on NH-39, 26 KM and 270 KM from Guwahati at Latitude: 26 degree 37'30" N and longitude: 93 degree 43'30" E with average elevation of 90m MSL. The refinery is located on highland, humid region free from flood. The mean maximum wind speed varies from 11 to 36 km/hr with maximum velocity occurring in monsoon (April to August) and minimum during winter (Nov to Jan). The refinery is only major industrial unit, and other medium scale industries within 20 km zone are Tata Tea garden and tea processing units. The nearby population is about 4 lacs in 31 villages located within 20 km radius area. The two perennial rivers Dhansiri and Kaliani flow at a distance of 2 and 3 km from the site. The river Brahmaputra flows at a distance of 17 km from the site. The patterns of

land use are Agriculture 60 %, Tea 20 % , Forest 2% and cultivation 18%.

There is no sensitive receptor within 10 km zone round the refinery. However Kaziranga National Park and Doyang reserve Forest is located at a distance of 20 and 25 km. The Nambor and Deopahar Reserve Forest are in close proximity of the refinery site.

The Refinery deals with complex refinery processes, handling and storage of various petroleum products. Despite of sophisticated fire protection facilities emergency may arise out of deficiency in operation, maintenance, human error, natural and man-made disasters. There is risk due to hazardous materials in the refinery, also transportation from the industry to various locations by rail, road and pipelines. If any major disaster occurs in the Horton sphere (LPG) plant the probable risk zone is approx..700 m, but this may defer depending upon the nature of the incident and other secondary or tertiary threat.

Also, there are Oil installations of ONGC under Dhansiri Sub-Division and pipelines buried under earth from Sarupathar area to Borholla under Jorhat. There is possibility of fire accidents leading to explosions at the installations, storage tanks, bursting of pipelines or theft in the pipelines causing spill over and leading to emergency situations.

One bullet (Reg. No. GJ-12AU-6782) carrying Propylene to BCPL, Dibrugarh got overturned near Rangamati area of NH-37 at around 11.30 PM of 27th Feb' 2017. The valve of the 2 inch vapour line located at the top of the bullet got detached from the threaded joint and huge quantity of propylene got released to atmosphere. The propylene vapour travelled along the wind direction towards a village located approximately 200 meters from the National Highway. The released propylene vapour got ignited in the village and **around 20 houses gutted in fire. Three persons were charred to death and 20 others sustained injuries in the incident along with loss of cattle and livestock**

CHAPTER-V
CAPACITY ANALYSIS

DISTRICT EMERGENCY OPERATION CENTRE (DEOC)

5.1 DEOC (Control Room):

District Emergency Operation Centre will function as Control Room and has been set up to help the Disaster Management Team members to understand the structure and functioning of District Control Room. Following the important Three C's i.e. Command, Control and Communication for effective response in an emergency, we will be able to minimize the suffering of the community and improve the quality of the process of recovery.

5.1.1 Purpose of the DEOC

The District Control Room under the control of Deputy Commissioner will operate round the clock and will be the nerve center to

- ❖ **Monitor**
- ❖ **Co-ordinate with all the Stake Holders.**
- ❖ **Implement the actions/activities for Disaster Management.**

In a disaster time the District Control Room will operate under the central authority of the Deputy Commissioner, exercising emergency power to issue directives to all departments to provide emergency response service. He will also co-ordinate with the State Response Machinery, Assam State Disaster Management Authority for appropriate support and smooth flow of information. The Control Room should be manned round the clock. The District Control Room is placed in the DC's Office, Golaghat.

DEOC will also function as Information Centre. The principle role involves collection of data, analysis and dissemination of information to all relevant organisations. It coordinates the flow of information with respect to activities associated with emergency operations. During the normal time it maintains a systematic database of the resources available, important phone numbers, names and addresses of important government and non government officials, NGOs etc.

5.1.2 Warning or Occurrence of Disaster:

The warning or occurrence of disaster will be communicated to:

- All Co-District Commissioners, Circle Officers and Officials of key departments.
- The SDRF and the Quick Response Team in the district.
- Civil Defence and Volunteer groups

In the absence of the DC or ADC, SDO will Officiate and exercise all the powers and responsibilities of the District Authority. On the receipt of warning, all community preparedness measures and counter-disaster measures would come into operation.

5.3 Communications and Media: Satellite phones , Wireless and V.H.F. stations are the quickest means of communication of weather warning and other important messages on flood and storm. Wireless and V.H.F. sets are available with the Police department. DDMA has one satellite phone provided by ASDMA for communication during emergency. Concerned Officers will ensure proper working of telephone during flood/storm. S.D.O Telephone Exchange, Golaghat may be requested to take steps to ensure proper working during flood and any other emergency situation. The District Information and Public Relation Officer (DIPRO) would make wide publicity for any warnings or awareness through Fixed Loud Speakers (FLS), Loud Speakers, through electronic or print media. DDMA Golaghat has four satellite phones for emergency communication.

5.4. Waterways: The Waterways that can be used during floods to run Motorboats and Country-boats are as follows:

1. Brahmaputra River;
 2. Dhansiri River;
 3. Doyang River
 4. Kakodonga River
- and several other streams and channels.

Besides, lakes, ponds and submerged low-lying land areas can also be used as Waterways. All these Waterways are vital in maintaining with cut-off and almost inaccessible areas in the District; and ensuring smooth distribution of Relief in those places; during the time of Floods.

Moreover, if any of the expected motorable roads gets cut off during high floods, Relief Supplies are to be ferried by machine/ country boats or air dropped.

5.5. Capability for Flood Forecasting:

Areas near the Brahmaputra River and the low-lying areas in the vicinity of Dhansiri and Kakodonga river are almost certain to experience floods; while other areas have varying degrees of probability of occurrence of floods. Some areas are not vulnerable as such; but may still experience flood in case of breach of protecting embankment. The intensity of the floods also varies.

The prediction of floods would be been done as follows.

1. Monitoring of Water Level of Local Rivers:

The Water Level of the Brahmaputra River and its tributary Dhansiri River, are being monitored by the Water Resources Department. The Water Level data would be obtained from gauges installed at specific points in the rivers concerned. Crossing the Warning Level implies the probability of floods in the near future; while surpassing the Danger Level signifies actual occurrence of floods.

Action: The Water Resources Department is to inform the Deputy Commissioner (Golaghat), District Emergency Operation Centre, and all the Circle Officers of the District. The Water Level data [along with the

Warning/ Danger Level marks; and the information whether the present levels concerned are rising/ falling/ remaining steady], by SMS/E mail/WT message on a daily basis without fail.

2. Flood Forecasts of ASDMA & NESAC, IMD, and CWC

The Assam State Disaster Management Authority (ASDMA) and North East Space Application Center (NESAC) provides early warning for Flood, prior to 24 or 48 hours, this can also be viewed at www.asdma.gov.in/www.imd.gov.in. The **Central Water Commission** of Govt. of India provides regular Flood Forecasts, which can be easily assessed at its own website www.cwc.gov.in.

CHAPTER-VII RESPONSIBILITIES OF LINE DEPARTMENTS

7.1. HEALTH & FAMILY WELFARE DEPARTMENT:

The Joint Director (Health) is required to have list of officials of his department working at different institution/locations. Whenever situation arises, he should be in a position to dispatch reasonable numbers of doctors, Para medical staff, medicines and other equipment to the site of occurrence of disaster whether it is flood or any other natural calamity e.g. earthquake, cloud-burst, storm etc. It is also necessary that he should have sufficient medicines in stock that should be available all the time. Lifesaving drugs should be utilized and replenished on and on.

7.1.1 Prevention Activities:

- ❖ Assess preparedness levels at District and Block levels.
- ❖ Prepare a list of hospitals, PHCs, CHCs, dispensaries and other institutions located in the area.
- ❖ Prepare list of doctors and Para-medical staff already available in each of the areas and the number of additional hands of each category that may be required in each of the areas in case of severe emergency.
- ❖ Prepare list of doctors and Para-medical staffs of different category who can be withdrawn from their places of work and their services utilized for emergency relief work.
- ❖ Ensure that adequate stock of medicines, vaccines and disinfectants likely to be necessary are kept at the district and sub-divisional headquarters.
- ❖ Keep ready materials for augmenting the hospital beds by at least 10 in case of necessity and opening one camp dispensary for each of the very vulnerable areas.
- ❖ Arrange for mobilizing at short notice two medical relief teams at the district HQ so as to rush them for relief work.
- ❖ Prepare a detailed plan for utilizing the doctors and other voluntary organizations in the district if so required.
- ❖ Take measures for prevention of epidemic and arrange vaccinations against small pox, cholera, typhoid etc. of the people in these areas.
- ❖ Identification of areas endemic to epidemics and natural disasters.
- ❖ Identification of appropriate locations for testing laboratories.
- ❖ Listing and networking with private health facilities.

- ❖ Strengthening of disease surveillance, ensuring regular reporting from the field level workers (ANMs/ASHA etc.) and its compilation and analysis at the PHC and District levels, on a weekly basis (daily basis in case of an epidemic or during natural disasters), forwarding the same to the State Disease Surveillance Cell and monthly feedback from the State to the district and from the District to the PHC.
- ❖ Formation of adequate number of mobile units with trained personnel, testing facilities, communication systems and emergency treatment facilities.
- ❖ Identification of locations in probable disaster sites for emergency operation camps.
- ❖ Awareness generation about various infectious diseases and their prevention.
- ❖ Training and IEC activities
- ❖ Training of field personnel, Traditional Birth Attendants, community leaders, volunteers, NGOs and CBOs in first aid, measures to be taken to control outbreak of epidemics during and after a disaster, etc.
- ❖ Arrangement of standby generators for every hospital.
- ❖ Listing of vehicles, repair of departmental vehicles that will be requisitioned during emergencies for transport of injured.
- ❖ Vector Control programme as a part of overall community sanitation activities.
- ❖ Surveillance and spraying of water bodies for control of malaria/ JE/ etc.
- ❖ Promoting and strengthening Primary Health Centres with network of para professionals to improve the capacity of surveillance and control of epidemics.
- ❖ Establishing testing laboratories at appropriate locations to reduce the time taken for early diagnosis and subsequent warning.
- ❖ Establishing procedures and methods of coordination with the local authorities/departments and NGOs to ensure that adequate prevention and preparedness measures have been taken to prevent and / or minimise the probable outbreak of epidemics.
- ❖ Identification of areas prone to certain epidemics and assessment of requirements to control and ultimately eradicate the epidemic.
- ❖ Identification of appropriate locations and setting up of site operation camps for combating epidemics.
- ❖ Provision in each hospital for receiving large number of injured persons at a time.

7.1.2. Response Activities:

- ❖ Alert sub-ordinate officers and staff for emergency on receipt of warning.
- ❖ Check vehicles, equipments, stores etc. and draw up tentative programme of action.
- ❖ Immediately visit the affected areas along with one medical relief team.

- ❖ Start measures for health relief in an institution located conveniently in the affected area.
- ❖ Make immediate arrangements to open additional camp dispensaries, if necessary.
- ❖ Utilize the services of Red Cross (If available) and other Volunteer Organizations.
- ❖ Frequently visit the affected areas and ensure effectiveness of health measures.
- ❖ Decide immediately on isolation of certain patients if necessary and arrange for isolation wards.
- ❖ Strengthening of drug supply system.
- ❖ Situational assessment and reviewing the status of response mechanisms in known vulnerable pockets.
- ❖ Ensure adequate availability of personnel in disaster sites.
- ❖ Review and update precautionary measures & procedures and apprise the personnel who will be implementing those.
- ❖ Disinfections of water bodies and drinking water sources.
- ❖ Immunization against infectious diseases.
- ❖ Ensure continuous flow of information.

7.1.3. **Recovery Activities:**

- ❖ Continuation of disease surveillance and monitoring.
- ❖ Continuation of treatment, monitoring and other epidemic control activities till the situation is brought under control and the epidemic eradicated.
- ❖ Trauma counselling.
- ❖ Treatment and socio-medical rehabilitation of injured or disabled persons.
- ❖ Immunisation and nutritional surveillance.
- ❖ Long term plans to progressively reduce various factors that contribute to high level of vulnerability to diseases of population affected by disasters.
- ❖ Restore equipment and stores.
- ❖ Repair or replace damaged equipments.
- ❖ Arrange for disposal of unutilized medicines and disinfectants.

7.2. WATER RESOURCES DEPARTMENT:

7.2.1 Prevention Activities:

- ❖ Update the District contingency plan in consultation with the administration
- ❖ Update embankment maintenance manual
- ❖ Activate flood monitoring in all flood prone areas and capture information through flood bulletin
- ❖ Establish coordination linkages with village teams for embankment strengthening and safety
- ❖ Undertake mapping of vulnerable areas and risk spots
- ❖ Undertake flood protection and erosion management measures
- ❖ Construction/strengthening/maintenance of embankment
- ❖ Undertake measures and direct action towards ensuring embankment safety
- ❖ Undertake mitigation actions across the department following the design criteria mentioned in the guidelines for the preparation of DPR of Central Water Commission, Govt. of India.
- ❖ Conduct pre-monsoon preparedness meeting in April every year to take stock of current status, discuss about critical areas, revisit protocols and operating procedures, check preparedness
- ❖ Identify active channels causing erosion and take remedial measures
- ❖ Associate with the IMD (to know the rainfall pattern and short term forecasts) and CWC (flood information, to know the flood level)
- ❖ Maintain Flood Bulletin Chart in all stations.
- ❖ Maintain Embankment Maintenance Manual
- ❖ Watch flood protection work at all times, with support of locals
- ❖ Observe and collect local data to determine flash floods

7.2.2. Response Activities:

- ❖ Translate department actions based on rainfall forecasts and flood information
- ❖ Activate response plans on the basis of the flood bulletin
- ❖ Ensure safety of embankments and take immediate protection measures to prevent breach

7.2.3 Recovery Activities:

- ❖ Undertake possible interventions to minimize further damage
- ❖ Undertake emergency and long term flood protection works and repairment of embankments

7.3. PUBLIC HEALTH ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT:

7.3.1 Prevention Activities:

The Executive Engineer (PHE) will ensure the supply of drinking water and will also have the plan to undertake the repair of water spots and flood protection activities during the occurrence of such incidents. He will also have to ensure the regular cleanliness/chlorination of all traditional water sources in the district and should have sufficient stores required to maintain/restore the drinking water supply. Moreover, he should have the details of manpower and materials available in the district at different locations who could be pressed into the action within the shortest possible notice.

- ❖ Develop department wide disaster preparedness plan
- ❖ Identify in advance emergency groundwater resources resistant to natural and man-made disasters that could replace damaged public and domestic drinking water supplies
- ❖ Develop guidelines for consumption/purification of water during disaster
- ❖ Ensure departmental/public awareness and encourage economic use of water
- ❖ Train department engineers in DM
- ❖ Plan movement of staff to disaster affected areas, delegation of responsibilities
- ❖ Restore plans for damaged facilities
- ❖ Maintain emergency stock of supplies (pre-contract agreement with suppliers can be a add-on)
- ❖ Undertake conditional assessment of existing infrastructure
- ❖ Undertake risk assessment of the departmental facilities and cite recommendations
- ❖ Protect/strengthen the supply network with alternative/complementary source
- ❖ Undertake protection measures of distribution infrastructure (pumps, motors and the like)
- ❖ On receipt of warning, make provisions for acquiring water supply tankers
- ❖ Undertake chlorination programmes
- ❖ Protect vital water supply infrastructure from contamination
- ❖ Arrange for alternate energy sources.

7.3.2 Response Activities:

- ❖ Provide immediate safe drinking water supply in disaster affected areas
 - ❖ Provide immediate safe drinking water supply for conduct of response activities at hospitals, emergency shelters, schools designated as shelters, relief camps
- ❖ Provide latrines/sanitary latrines in Relief Camps quickly
- ❖ Provide hygienic measures to keep Relief Camps free from outbreak of epidemics/health hazards

7.3.3 Recovery Activities:

- ❖ Assist line departments and agencies in identification sources of potable water
- ❖ Undertake swift actions to restore damages lines
- ❖ Undertake regular checks to determine key potable parameters of the water supplied
- ❖ Restore all service for pre-disaster phase and maintain check on vital quality including bacteriological parameters

7.4 POLICE DEPARTMENT:

The Superintendent of Police should have the information with him relating to his manpower available at each level, so that in case of need even those persons who are on leave can be called and put on duty. His services are needed to maintain law and order. It is also required that he keeps watch on anti-social elements, rumour-mongers and those elements who want to take advantage of the situations.

7.4.1. Prevention Activities:

- ❖ Keep the force in general and the Rapid Action Force in particular fighting fit for search, rescue, evacuation and other emergency operations at all times through regular drills.
- ❖ Procurement and deployment of modern emergency equipments while modernizing existing infrastructure and equipments for disaster response along with regular training and drills for effective handling of these equipments.
- ❖ Focus on better training and equipments for Rapid Action Force for all types of disasters, e.g. diving equipments.
- ❖ Rotation of members of Rapid Action Force so that the force remains fighting fit.
- ❖ Ensure that all communication equipments including wireless are regularly functioning and deployment of extra wireless units in vulnerable pockets.
- ❖ Keeping close contact with the District Administration & Project Officer (ASDMA).
- ❖ Involvement of the local army units in response planning activities and during the preparation of the annual contingency plans to ensure logistics and other support to armed forces during emergencies.

7.4.2 Response Activities:

- ❖ Traffic management and patrolling of all highways and other access roads to disaster sites. Making sure that discipline is maintained.
- ❖ Assistance to district administration for taking necessary action against hoarders, black marketers and those found manipulating relief material.
- ❖ Coordinate search, rescue and evacuation operations in coordination with the administration and Emergency traffic management.
- ❖ Maintenance of law and order in the affected areas.
- ❖ Security arrangements for relief materials in transit and in camps etc.

- ❖ Provision of security in transit camps/feeding centres/relief camps/cattle camps/cooperative food stores and distribution centres.
- ❖ Safeguarding the belongings of evacuees.
- ❖ FIR of the disaster, the damages and the death cases.
- ❖ Assisting in collection of damage statistics of private properties and distribution of assistance such as grants or subsidies.

7.5. DISTRICT FOOD, PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION AND CONSUMER AFFAIRS:

In disaster situations the supply of essential commodities has to be ensured. The Civil supplies corporation and food & civil supplies department should have information of the stock available in different go-downs of the district/state and it should also be ensured by them that whenever required they should be in a position to provide essential food stuff and other essential commodities at a short notice without delay.

7.5.1 Prevention Activities:

- ❖ Stock pile of resources throughout the year for emergency needs
- ❖ Monitor the stock and undertake periodic checks of stored items (ensure quality and label „fit for human consumption“)
- ❖ Prepare department wide preparedness and operational plan for distribution of supplies to people
- ❖ Undertake strengthening of all facilities and storage godowns across the District.
- ❖ Keep updated on weather bulletins and warning related information
- ❖ Estimate the population at risk and those who would be needing support
- ❖ Identify mechanisms for safe transport of food items to the affected population (ensure quality and label „fit for human consumption“)
- ❖ Designate locations for pre-stock of supplies in relief camps

7.5.2 Response Activities:

- ❖ Coordinate with local authorities and transport essential supplies to disaster affected areas and pre-determined locations (relief centres)
- ❖ Provide tailored food packets to people with special needs
- ❖ Mobilize air/land/inland water transport for supply to far off destinations or regions which are inaccessible

7.5.3 Recovery Activities:

- ❖ Curb unfair practices
- ❖ Provide food supply to relief centres and kitchens till lifted off by the district/local administration
- ❖ Issue duplicate ration cards
- ❖ Maintain price of basic commodities in disaster affected areas

7.6 AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT:

7.6.1 Prevention Activities:

- ❖ Undertake skill upgradation of department staff and farmers
- ❖ Prepare state wide preparedness plan to manage drought and hazards like floods, pest attacks and others
- ❖ Generate awareness on hazards, weather monitoring and suggest actions
- ❖ Drought Monitoring System
- ❖ Pest and Disease Monitoring System
- ❖ Provide information to undertake crop insurance
- ❖ Identify storage houses/godowns for early harvest
- ❖ Establish Early Warning mechanisms
- ❖ Gather information related to warning of impending floods, droughts or pest attacks
- ❖ Take necessary precautions, actions, including moving of farm equipment/tools to safe locations
- ❖ In case of pest attacks, determine the source/disease and take measures for protection of standing crops
- ❖ Advise harvesting if permissible, this will reduce losses which otherwise could be higher

7.6.2 Response Activities:

- ❖ Assessment of damage to crops
- ❖ Estimation of recovery
- ❖ Discuss with the farming community through agriculture extension cells and support conduction of cleaning operations (to avoid long term water-logging, salinity)

7.6.3 Recovery Activities:

- ❖ Provide technical support to prevent further damages and help resume agriculture/farming operations and restore soil conditions
- ❖ Provide support and material inputs/farm implements to assist in recovery
- ❖ Quantify loss estimate due to the event and suggest remedial/prevention measures
- ❖ Depending on the intensity of the damage, establish a programme for agriculture rehabilitation
- ❖ Ensure farmers are connected to the market (restore agriculture produce market)
- ❖ Equip farmers with knowledge to deal with drought risks/hydro-meteorological and climate related disasters
- ❖ Plan for establishment of „climate field schools“

7.7 WOMEN & CHILD DEVELOPEEMT DEPARTMENT:

During any disaster situation, the weakest and the neglected viz., children, old and infirm, handicapped and expectant/nursing mothers suffer most. The community has a special responsibility for protecting them. The Social Welfare department is entrusted with this responsibility.

7.7.1 Prevention Activities:

- ❖ Integrate DM concerns in the ongoing welfare development schemes in the district.
- ❖ Identifying/communicate resource management at local level/community level to assist themselves to meet immediate needs of water, food, clothing and shelter (promote self-help)
- ❖ Develop social safety nets taking into consideration hazard risks in the region where the welfare schemes are under implementation.
- ❖ Identify evacuation points/centres for communities
- ❖ Facilitate provision of services to meet people"s needs in risk prone areas

7.7.2 Response Activities:

- ❖ Provide welfare services to disaster affected people
- ❖ Ensure proper care of the uncared
- ❖ Provide protection to the most vulnerable sections of the society
- ❖ Facilitate the process of financial assistance

7.7.3 Recovery Activities:

- ❖ Participate and involve in recovery efforts and community rehabilitation
- ❖ Administer relief/financial assistance is made eligible to disaster affected individuals/communities
- ❖ Create an environment which is conducive to the all-round development of children, women and physically challenged persons

7.8 Town & Country Planning Department

7.8.1 Prevention Activities:

- ❖ Direct the urban areas to prepare city wide disaster management plan for every city/town and detail ward level DM plan to meet any type of exigency
- ❖ Provide training and capacity building to department staff in disaster management
- ❖ Direct the local government to submit the DM Plan to UDD and DDMA.
- ❖ Identify mechanisms for outreach of information to people residing in urban areas
- ❖ Set up areas for the establishment of relief camps

7.8.2 Response Activities:

- ❖ Undertake rapid assessments of damaged areas
- ❖ Housing back people to homes that are determined safe
- ❖ Work with line departments / agencies for the removal of debris
- ❖ Mobilize efforts for undertaking heavy urban search and rescue operations, medical care/mass casualty care
- ❖ Make arrangements to shelter the needy and minimize failure of basic services

7.8.3 Recovery Activities:

- ❖ Restoration of basic services
- ❖ Provision of temporary housing and implementation of Relief & Rehabilitation package for urban areas

7.9 PWD (ROADS & BUILDINGS) DEPARTMENT:

Restoration of communication is of utmost importance in such an eventuality and Executive Engineer is required to be well equipped with emergency plan in the event of disaster taking place. He should have complete information with regard to manpower, machinery and materials at all the places in the district, at his disposal and priority shall be given to re-open the blocked/closed roads and to provide the manpower in case of exigency. Govt. buildings/ Communicable roads should be inspected and necessary repairs to be got executed following standing hazards affected.

7.9.1 Prevention Activities:

- ❖ Develop Department level preparedness plan
- ❖ Identify core teams for technical/engineering support/decision making in disaster situations
- ❖ Develop manuals and guidelines for safe construction practices
- ❖ Conduct training of staff in latest advancements of engineering, demolition techniques, health monitoring of infrastructure assets, seismic strengthening and retrofitting of buildings, critical infrastructure protection, DM
- ❖ Maintain inventory list of all key equipment and tools in the district that can be mobilised for response and recovery efforts
- ❖ Integrate risk reduction as a component in design and construction practice of the department
- ❖ Identify weak lifeline buildings and develop strategy for strengthening/retrofitting so as to minimize damage/disruption
- ❖ Undertake vulnerability assessment of buildings and determine mitigation options
- ❖ Establish mitigation funds within the department
- ❖ Ensure/undertake checks that infrastructure remains in operational condition should disaster occur
- ❖ Preposition emergency supplies and equipment/tools in high risk concentration areas

- ❖ Undertake prevention/protection/structural rehabilitation/retrofitting measures of lifeline buildings
- ❖ Provide regular capacity building/training to the staff to help them undertake vulnerability assessment of critical lifelines and develop mitigation options
- ❖ Ensure that all design and construction in the department are in compliance to Indian Construction Codes of Practice (BIS) and National Building Code/Building Bye laws.
- ❖ Work towards Performance Based Seismic Design
- ❖ Categorize structural performance/vulnerability assessment on the basis of the performance based design parameters
- ❖ Establish „Building Clinic“ with adequate trained staff to advise on strengthening and retrofitting of lifeline buildings/infrastructure
- ❖ Undertake emergency repairs/shoring measures
- ❖ Secure tools and equipment in safe locations, pre-position if needed
- ❖ Establish emergency communication network (inter/intra department)

7.9.2 Response Activities:

- ❖ Direct department engineering cadre for emergency response operations
- ❖ Coordinate temporary repairs to buildings and related infrastructure
- ❖ Undertake damage assessment of buildings and related infrastructure
- ❖ Undertake emergency repair and shoring of buildings
- ❖ Undertake construction of temporary structures and supporting structures to provide basic services to the affected population
- ❖ Controlled demolition and shoring up of buildings which have turned hazardous due to severe damage/tilting/settlement

7.9.3 Recovery Activities:

- ❖ Participate in conduct of structural damage assessments
- ❖ Guide urban authorities and line agencies on structural repair works and package development of repair/reconstruction scheme for housing and related social infrastructure
- ❖ Undertake detailed damage assessment of buildings
- ❖ Advise reconstruction/recovery of buildings and community infrastructure
- ❖ Coordinate, monitor progress and prepare report- repair, reconstruction and strengthening/retrofitting of buildings
- ❖ Prepare estimates and undertake repair/strengthening works
- ❖ Provide technical guidance/guidelines for construction of new buildings
- ❖ Supervise the civil work activities and ensure safe construction practices are streamlined during Recovery/Reconstruction phase

Prevention Activities:

- ❖ Develop Department level preparedness plan
- ❖ Identify core teams for technical/engineering support/decision making in disaster situations
- ❖ Develop manuals and guidelines for safe construction practices

- ❖ Conduct training of staff in latest advancements of engineering, demolition techniques, health monitoring of infrastructure assets, seismic strengthening and retrofitting of buildings, critical infrastructure protection, DM
- ❖ Maintain inventory list of all key equipment and tools in the district that can be mobilised for response and recovery efforts
- ❖ Integrate risk reduction as a component in design and construction practice of the department
- ❖ Identify weak lifeline buildings and develop strategy for strengthening/retrofitting so as to minimize damage/disruption
- ❖ Undertake vulnerability assessment of buildings and determine mitigation options

- ❖ Undertake detailed damage assessment of critical infrastructure
- ❖ Advise reconstruction/recovery of infrastructure
- ❖ Coordinate, monitor progress and prepare report- repair, reconstruction and strengthening/retrofitting of infrastructure
- ❖ Prepare estimates and undertake repair/strengthening works
- ❖ Supervise the civil work activities and ensure safe construction practices are streamlined during Recovery/Reconstruction phase

7.10 Power Department

7.10.1 Prevention Activities:

- ❖ Take up restoration plans of supply following an interruption across services/communication to all service agencies for preparedness measures and installation of back-up measures
- ❖ Undertake Disaster Management plan preparation for the department and guide support agencies in formulation of their plans
- ❖ Undertake condition surveys of existing infrastructure and pin-point areas for intervention
- ❖ Upgrade skill and training of staff in Disaster Management
- ❖ Identify weak spots in allied/liked infrastructure or power dependent sectors and recommend actions
- ❖ Conduct vulnerability assessment of buildings and power infrastructure
- ❖ Determine fragility of infrastructure to hazard risks and determine mitigation and non- structural mitigation actions
- ❖ Establish mitigation fund and prioritize actions for risk reduction within the power sector
- ❖ Undertake emergency repair works as and when necessary
- ❖ On receipt of advisory, maintain vigil and undertake inspection works wherever necessary

7.10.2 Response Activities:

- ❖ Undertake rapid assessment/inspection of damage to power infrastructure
- ❖ Undertake emergency repair of damage poles/equipment
- ❖ Dispatch quick response teams for restoration of power lines
- ❖ Address disruption to lifelines- water, sewerage services and transport routes in association with line agencies and arrange for alternate power supply arrangements at critical facilities

- ❖ Restore power supply to key lifeline/emergency services such as health care, decision support buildings, industries and other infrastructures

7.10.3 Recovery Activities:

- ❖ Document lessons learnt and incorporate/update the Power Sector DM plan
- ❖ Undertake detail damage assessments of power infrastructures
- ❖ Take steps towards speedy repair and complete restoration of services

7.11 Fire & Emergency Services and SDRF

7.11.1 Prevention Activities:

- ❖ Development/enforcement of relevant legislations and regulations to enhance adoption of fire safety measures.
- ❖ Modernisation of fire-fighting equipments and strengthening infrastructure. Identification of pockets, industry, etc. which highly susceptible to fire accidents or areas, events which might lead to fires, building collapse, etc. and educate people to adopt safety measures. Conduct training and drills to ensure higher level of prevention and preparedness.
- ❖ Building awareness in use of various fire protection and preventive systems.
- ❖ Training the communities to handle fire emergencies more effectively.
- ❖ VHF network for fire services linked with revenue & police networks.
- ❖ Making clearance of building plans by fire services mandatory.

7.11.2 Response Activities:

- ❖ Rescue of persons trapped in burning, collapsed or damaged buildings, damaged vehicles, including motor vehicles, trains and aircrafts, industries, boilers and pressure vessels, trenches and tunnels.
- ❖ Control of fires and minimising damages due to explosions.
- ❖ Control of other dangerous or hazardous situations such as oil, gas and hazardous materials spill.
- ❖ Protection of property and the environment from fire damage.
- ❖ Support to other agencies in the response to emergencies.
- ❖ Investigation into the causes of fire and assist in damage assessment.

7.12 CIVIL DEFENCE, HOMEGUARDS

7.12.1 Prevention Activities:

- ❖ Organise training programmes on first-aid, search & rescue and evacuation.
- ❖ Preparation and implementation of first aid, search and rescue service plans for major public events in the District.
- ❖ Remain fit and prepared through regular drills and exercises at all times.

7.12.2. Response Activities:

- ❖ Act as Support agency for provision of first aid, search and rescue services to other emergency service agencies and the public.
- ❖ Act as support agency for movement of relief.
- ❖ Triage of casualties and provision of first aid and treatment.
- ❖ Work in co-ordination with medical assistance team.
- ❖ Help the Police for traffic management and law and order.

7.13. Panchayat and Rural Development Department

7.13.1 Prevention Activities:

- ❖ Analyze type of hazard risks in the areas under the Panchayat
- ❖ Form various committees among the youth for effective response
- ❖ Organize drill practices to raise awareness and test local plans
- ❖ Develop DM plans for the department
- ❖ Undertake training and capacity building of staff, elected representatives and other officials
- ❖ Promote the concept of village cluster DM plan
- ❖ Ensure that all development schemes routed through the department or through various schemes directed for implementation, taking into consideration of DM requirements.
- ❖ Undertake measures to strengthen the department buildings across the district
- ❖ Coordinate with the officials to relay information and activate the plan (based on threat levels)

7.13.2 Response Activities:

- ❖ Coordinate with line agencies/departments and ensure supply of relief materials
- ❖ Coordinate support from line agencies to undertake response activities

7.13.3 Recovery Activities:

- ❖ Strengthen the capacity by involving people in Relief & Rehabilitation efforts.

7.14. EDUCATION DEPARTMENT:

7.14.1 Prevention Activities:

- ❖ Develop a department wide plan in Disaster Management
- ❖ Ensure all schools/institutions within the department jurisdiction (Government and Private) have Building Level Emergency Response/Preparedness Plan
- ❖ Undertake training of teachers in preparation of School Disaster Management Plan
- ❖ Undertake training of children and school staff in basic first-aid, select search and rescue methods.
- ❖ Organize rallies and education programmes to raise awareness
- ❖ Encourage volunteer participation in DM activities and conduct preparedness drills
- ❖ Undertake vulnerability assessments of education infrastructure and publish analysis/findings
- ❖ Identify structural and non-structural risk reduction/mitigation measures
- ❖ Develop district Level Mitigation Plans
- ❖ Work towards developing safety policies and safety rules that can be applicable to both Government and Private run institutions
- ❖ Ensure hazard resistant designs is an integral part of design and construction of new buildings/rooms or any expansion activity
- ❖ Convey appropriate information to the administrative staff in the department and relay further information based on established protocols

7.14.2 Response Activities:

- ❖ Undertake rapid damage assessment of health facilities. Declare facilities fit for continuing operations
- ❖ Notify continuation of activities or temporary closure till situation is normalized
- ❖ Based on the notification/disaster declaration, provide necessary support for the functioning of schools as temporary shelters/relief distribution centres

7.14.3 Recovery Activities:

- ❖ Undertake detailed damage assessments of education infrastructure
- ❖ Ensure DDR that concerns are considered in the design of new facilities/strengthening of existing facilities

7.15. Animal Husbandry & Veterinary Department

7.15.1 Prevention Activities:

- ❖ Determine livestock population risk to various hazards
- ❖ Identify list of possible shelter points
- ❖ Maintain livestock update and list down essential supplies/equipment required in case of disaster

- ❖ Train staff to ensure/undertake quarantine requirements
- ❖ Plan response and recovery operations
- ❖ Encourage farmers for insurance of livestock
- ❖ Establish monitoring mechanism for disease control
- ❖ identify shelter, fodder requirements, veterinary equipment
- ❖ In case of disease outbreak, follow necessary instruction and protocol identified by the department.
- ❖ Detection, diagnosis, assessment of risk and surveillance of the disease
- ❖ Vector Control, Quarantine Control

7.15.2 Response Activities:

- ❖ Eradicate and control animal diseases
- ❖ Deploy team to do quick access of damage and identify requirement for relief/rescue, equipment and fodder
- ❖ Assessment of injured stock and undertake treatment measures
- ❖ Coordinate with wildlife department to take necessary measures and treatment of injured animals
- ❖ Manage livestock population in emergency period, provide treatment to injured animals
- ❖ Coordinate with agencies for supply and distribution of fodder and other materials
- ❖ Draw assistance from the local government and line agencies to dispose of carcass in a scientific manner, disinfection of contaminated areas
- ❖ Draw measures for protection and care of abandoned livestock
- ❖ Establish infrastructure support, include cattle camps, feeding centres, veterinary aid centres

7.15.3 Recovery Activities:

- ❖ Ensure relief distribution and administer financial assistance
- ❖ Undertake detail damage and loss assessment for the Sector, determine financial assistance
- ❖ Continue giving veterinary advice till business returns to normal
- ❖ Continue undertaking assessments of injured animal stock, coordinate disposal of carcass

7.16. Irrigation Department

7.16.1 Prevention Activities:

- ❖ Undertake DM plan preparation for department and guide support agencies in formulation of their plans
- ❖ Prepare Preparedness plan for manage drought & drought like situation
- ❖ Undertake condition survey of existing bunds, irrigation channel & drains that come under its jurisdiction and identify areas for intervention
- ❖ Take short term, medium term and long-time preventive measures
- ❖ Help DDMA to identify the vulnerable areas, infrastructures and to incorporate in DDMP
- ❖ Develop District wise preparedness plan towards protection of irrigation of

Irrigation Assets and providing water supply in drought.

- ❖ Identify vulnerable points of irrigation structure like Head Works, Aqueduct, Cross Drainage including canals embankments and canal system.
- ❖ Undertake monitoring of regular vigilance of I/S and duty of field staff and Head Work/other important vulnerable structures
- ❖ Conduct vulnerability assessments relating to flood/drought/ erosion hazard of infrastructure it built or look after.
- ❖ Establish mitigation fund and prioritize actions for risk reduction
- ❖ Ensure timely completion of works undertaken before flood season
- ❖ Undertake flood protection management measures at vulnerable structures/canals systems
- ❖ Maintain canal embankments/guide bunds/affix bunds including canal structures
- ❖ Conduct pre monsoon preparedness meeting in April every year to take stock of the current status of irrigation projects, discuss critical areas, revisit protocol operating producers, preparedness, checks and others
- ❖ Gather information related to warning of impending floods/droughts based on hydrological and meteorological information
- ❖ Identify drought like areas for necessary steps towards irrigation supply in areas covered under irrigation
- ❖ On receipt of advisory, maintain vigil and undertake inspection works wherever necessary Undertake emergency measures to provide water to vulnerable agricultural areas

7.16.2 Response Activities:

- ❖ Undertake rapid assessment/inspection of damage to the infrastructure during flood/erosion
- ❖ Undertake emergency repair of damage infrastructure like irrigation drainage, agricultural channels and others
- ❖ Coordinate with Agriculture department during drought and drought like situation
- ❖ Translate information based on rainfall forecast and weather forecast
- ❖ Activate response plan based on rainfall/weather forecast to combat flood/drought like situation
- ❖ Take immediate protection measures to prevent damage to structure/canal systems
- ❖ Take steps to supply water to field on drought like situations

7.16.3 Recovery Activities:

- ❖ Undertake detail damage assessments
- ❖ Take steps towards speedy repair and complete restoration of infrastructure
- ❖ Process proposals through the DDMA to the Government for consideration under SDRF
- ❖ Undertake possible intervention to minimize further damage
- ❖ Undertake emergency measures

CHAPTER-VIII

INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENT AT THE DISTRICT LEVEL

8.1. Roles and Responsibilities of the DDMA.

PREPAREDNESS & MITIGATION MEASURES (AT NORMAL TIME)

1. Once a quarter, check that the database for multi hazard District DM plan is updated. The nodal officer of District control room, to update the database & report to the State HQ in a specified time.
2. Once a month check that all equipment in the District Emergency Operation Center (DEOC) is functional & the maintenance is carried out as per the maintenance manual of each equipment (each equipment like FAX, computer with printer & E-mail, generator, telephone, mobile phone & any other equipments in the DEOC must have a maintenance manual & all records on maintenance up to date duly authenticated with sign of Nodal Officer).
3. Half yearly review meeting of all line departments in respect of all disaster preparedness & mitigation activities like strengthening of embankments, construction/strengthening of vulnerable roads, construction of multipurpose safe shelters, digging/renovation/repair of tube wells with raised platforms for drinking water, arrangements for stocking of relief materials, equipments, medicines, hygiene & chemicals before disaster season etc.
4. Fresh Training for all newly posted /refresher training of all old officials in disaster management who are part of state DMC & DMT to be carried out in a planned manner once a year. A register will be maintained in the DDMA where the names of trained personnel will be recorded giving the dates of training duly signed & authenticated by the Nodal Officer. Whenever the officer is posted out a note to this effect will be recorded in his/her relieve order giving the details of training attended so that the person is available in the new location for disaster management & duplication of effort for training is avoided.
5. Training of officials who will man the DEOC in the 24-hour cycle for the entire disaster season to be completed in time.
6. The NGO/volunteers/NCC/NSS/NYKS/Scout & guide co-ordination meetings are held & their activities especially for DM is fully co-coordinated based on their experience & expertise. The area of each NGO should be clearly known to each NGO as well as district administration. The activities to be co-coordinated right till village level. The list of NGOs/specialized NGOs/Volunteers to be available in the area of operation from village to district & a master list giving details of each area to be maintained in the DEOC.
7. Lat-Long of vulnerable areas, schools/shelters, helipads & dropping zones should be available with the DEOC.

8. Awareness campaign strategy before the Flood season in terms of warning dissemination procedures, individual/house hold safety tips etc planned.

9. Coordination meeting with all stake holders to be held in every quarter & emergency level of stocks to be maintained by each department, service provider etc. before every disaster season & actual disaster periods.

PRIOR TO COMMENCEMENT OF DISASTER SEASON

1. The multi hazard disaster management plans of the district to be complete in all respects with latest up to date database. Certified reports to be submitted by DCs with up to date database are ready.

2. Fully equipped & operational DEOC. Equipments are checked for functionality. Communications tested & established with IMD, Revenue DEOC, and departmental control room, DEOC. All batteries are fully charged & generator at DEOC put to trial run for atleast for continuous 2 - 4 hours. Report to the extent that all actions are complete & the DEOC & its equipments are fully operational is given to Deputy Commissioner.

3. All members of state DMC & DMT are fully trained & aware of their roles & responsibilities as per the DM plan.

4. All persons to man the DEOC are fully trained & aware of their responsibilities.

5. Duty roaster for DEOC prepared & all informed.

6. All storage godowns & safe shelters of all the vulnerability pockets are cleaned, maintained, fully stocked as per the DM plans. Certified fort-nightly reports to this effect given by DC in respect of all blocks and circles even villages.

7. Meetings of DMCs are conducted & all functionaries of different department are to be fully apprised of their roles as per the DM plans.

8. All equipments like boats, dozers, earthmovers, road clearance equipment etc are operational & placed at most vulnerable points by the concerned line departments in consultation with the Responsible Officer and Incident Commander.

9. Preparedness activities of all line departments like strengthening of embankments, sinking/repair of tube wells & ensuring raised plat forms/raised grounds so that they do not get sub merged, stocking of medicines& allocation of medical/Para-medical staff as per the DM plan, operationalization flood gauges & rain gauges with communication facilities etc. are completed in all respects & certified completion report submitted to the Responsible Officer cum Deputy Commissioner.

10. For earthquake prone areas, the identification of risk and vulnerable structures, buildings, land slide prone areas, possible threat areas are to be done. Deployment of volunteers, doctors, nurses, beds, food materials with drinking water to be arranged.

11. Mock drills conducted at all levels & report furnished to dist. collectors. (Some Govt. officers are designated for each mock drill who supervise & report to the authority with recommendations for any additions /deletions)

12. Co-ordinate with the NGO is complete & each NGO is aware of their areas of operation& level of participation.

13. Co-ord meeting of all the stockiest held & each one given the level of emergency stocks that they have to maintain during the disaster season (dry foods, kerosene, petrol, diesel. medicines, blood, candles, match boxes, daily house hold items etc.

14. Awareness campaign launched as per plan.

ON RECEIPT OF WARNING

72 HOURS PRIOR (All are warned, normal activities to continue, movement of vulnerable community like fisher men are restricted if special warnings issued)

1. DEOC activated & made functional on 24-hour cycle. Message IN & OUT registers are maintained & SEOC kept informed on minute-to-minute basis.

2. Exact details of the implications of the warning checked from the IMD & SEOC

3. Warning with clear directions for the Govt. officials, NGOs especially for the vulnerable community are passed through the fastest means of communication & checked back for accuracy at the other end.

4. Duplicated communication is established with the important departments, IMD & all the districts, subdivisions and blocks.

5. Meeting of the DMC, line depts. & NGOs involved in DM is held & clear directions for each ones responsibilities are spelt out as per the DM plan

6. Warning issued to disaster managers to check their men, material & equipments as per the checklist & vulnerable communities check their response mechanism as per the household & individual checklist in accordance with DM plan.

7. Stocking of all safe shelters is checked & those NOT stocked are immediately stocked.

8. Strengthening of all individual & community houses completed.

9. Areas for animals cleaned & re earmarked if required. Animal fodder & feed stocking has to be done.

48 HOURS PRIOR TO DISASTER

(Preparation to move by disaster managers & vulnerable community commences & out door movement in most vulnerable areas restricted if warnings received)

1. All the equipments of the DEOC especially the communication equipments are thoroughly checked & all back-up battery fully charged & positioned. Generators are re checked for functionality & fuel checked & stored properly.

2. Connectivity status of each districts, police stations, wireless stations, vulnerable points rechecked & chart at DEOC up dated with information to state EOC"s. Duplicated communication including police channels tested.

3. All the stockiest are warned to keep assured level of stocks to move at short notice.

4. All transporters warned to keep the assured vehicles to be hired at short notice.

5. All rescue & Evacuation equipments moved to most vulnerable pockets located in far-flung areas.

6. All disaster managers complete preparations to move. Disasters managers with men, materials & equipments moved to inaccessible pockets.

7. All preparations for move to safe shelters by vulnerable community completed.

8. All dist. admin for mutual aid scheme complete preparations as per checklist to move men, material & equipments.
9. All NGOs/volunteers/NCC/NSS/NYKs/Scouts & guides personnel briefed about their area of operations & ready to move. Move to inaccessible pockets starts.

12 HOURS PRIOR

(Move to safe shelters by vulnerability community, move of disaster managers & volunteers with complete equipments, material& men completed to designated vulnerable areas & out door movement restricted).

1. All vulnerable personnel are asked to shift to safe shelter.
2. All the task forces are put into operation.
3. All the NGOs & volunteers are put into operation as per their area of responsibility & their activities monitored through the concerned Govt. officials.
4. The stockiest warned to keep their stocks ready to move at short notice.
5. Media/public briefing systems activated on 6hourly basis.

6. The transports as per the plan are hired as per requirement. Other transport is kept warned for a state of readiness.
7. The progress is constantly monitored.
8. The dist. not likely to be affected & planned to provide mutual aid during disaster stage forward their resources & operationalise their support process.
9. In case of a warning that the cyclone has abated or changed course the same should be confirmed from authentic sources like the IMD or State Control room & information passed to all to stand down.
10. Information to National control room regularly.
11. In most vulnerable pockets OIC disaster site/incident commanders notified.

ACTIONS ON DISASTER

1. Nominated incident commanders/OIC disaster site at each of the sites start operations to supervise rescue & Evacuation, relief & restoration operations.
2. Co-ordinate all activities through incident commanders/OIC disaster site.
3. Opening of site control room with dist. Admn.
4. Those requiring immediate medical treatment are moved to dist. /medical college hospitals as per the priority of evacuation spelt out by the attending doctors.
5. The incident commanders/OIC disaster site assisted by the Magistrates /NGOs carry out an immediate assessment after reconnoitre & survey to identify the damages, casualties, gaps/short falls in terms of food, water, medical aid, clothing, shelter & send the demand to the DMIC.

6. The men, material & resources are moved as per the requirements & priority laid out by the OIC/ incident commander & short falls are moved from the other dists/state.
7. Temporary shelters, kitchens, water points are organised & operationalised.
8. Sanitary checks & disease surveillance are put into operation.
9. Arrangements for animal camp & fodder organised.
10. Carcass disposal teams if required are activated.
11. A detailed assessment is carried out for damage, casualties, resource shortfall by deploying additional officers with support from the NGOs/Volunteers, PRI & community after reconnoitre & survey.
12. Regular review meeting with line departments, NGOs.
13. All DCs are to send daily SITREP from district DMIC on 6hrly basis.
14. Continuous flow of information & national authorities kept informed of latest details.

POST DISASTER ACTIVITIES

(Depending on the situation but preferably after three days)

1. Compilation of departmental damage report and report from District authorities.
2. Assistance in terms of food material, medicines, and clothing, cooking utensils provided to the affected population controlled through DEOC & incident commander/OIC of the disaster site.
3. All stores & materials are moved as per the detailed assessment & distributed under the supervision of Govt. officers, volunteers & responsible representatives from the community.
4. Ensure of all drinking water sources are disinfected & activated by concerned dept.
5. Disinfections of the disaster site carried.
6. Disease surveillance to check occurrence of epidemic if any & preventive measures.
7. Trauma counselling if required is carried out for affected population.
8. A team of Govt. officials, NGOs/ local senior citizens consisting of specialists from all fields is immediately asked to prepare a detailed report starting from the activities from pre disaster season to the disaster & post disaster period bringing out all aspects of preparedness, response, restoration, rehabilitation, the detailed causes of damages &, casualties & deficiencies noticed in the plan. The detailed report must be completed in all respects & submitted within 30 days

POINTS FOR CONTINUOUS PLANNING, INNOVATIVE THINKING & IMPLEMENTATION

1. All developmental plans approved by state / dist. authorities are considered from disaster mitigation angle.
2. Continuous planning & execution of plans for providing sustainable livelihood for most vulnerable communities.
4. Alternate safe housing technology along with rainwater harvesting structures is constantly encouraged & main streamed for long-term vulnerability reduction.
5. Continuous Awareness campaign & encouragement for Disaster proof Habitat planning at community level including shifting from low lying areas to safe raised grounds.(with some incentives if feasible).

6. Disaster management including first-aid & rescue & evacuation as a compulsory part of school, college, educational institutions (both techno-tech) curriculum starting from primary level.

7. Equipping each PHC/CHC/ hospitals to provide training in first-aid round the year & making it compulsory for all citizens to learn first –aid.

8. One centre school/college in the district equipped to provide training in rescue & evacuation round the year.

CHAPTER-IX

9.1 STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURE (SOP)

DISTRICT EMERGENCY OPERATION CENTRE (DEOC) ,GOLAGHAT

INTRODUCTION

Background: Golaghat district is a Multi Hazard district as it is vulnerable to Flood, Erosion, Fire, Industrial disaster , Storm , man-made disasters etc.

Purpose: To identify roles & responsibilities of every Officer or personnel engaged in emergency operations and plan for effective response and for proper data management and communication with all stake holders and SEOC.

Scope: The SOP for DEOC would be applicable for the Officers engaged in emergency operations and Information Assistants at the DEOC.

Responsibilities:

START IMMEDIATELY ON RECEIVING STORM / FLOOD WARNING OR

INFORMATION ABOUT ANY OTHER EMERGENCY

1. Officer in charge of Control Room: The control room shall be in overall charge of the Deputy Commissioner as the Responsible Officer (RO). In the absence of DC, ADC (Disaster Management), or any other Officer or staff on duty at that point of time shall remain in charge of Control Room/DEOC. The person in charge of control room/DEOC shall be personally responsible for implementing the SOP.
2. Assembly in DEOC: The Incident Commander & Dy.Incident Commander, DIPRO, Liaison Officer, Safety Officer and Chiefs of all Sections will arrive at the DEOC during occurrence of any incident in the district or emergency situation arises. The Officers of line departments shall assemble in the DOEC on getting any information from any source about any emergency.
3. The R.O will hold a meeting with the Incident Commander, Dy. Incident Commander, DIPRO, Liaison Officer, Safety Officer and Chiefs of all Sections at the DEOC during any emergency and ensure active participation of all departments in response.
4. The RO will give directions to any department or authority regarding actions to be taken.
5. The liaison Officer will coordinate with all concerned and on receiving any information would update the Incident Commander and Responsible Officer

6. The Information Assistant would contact the Rev. Circle Officer and take update of the situation and after approval of I.C and R.O inform the SEOC.
7. The APRO personnel will contact with the P.S and also connect communication with the SEOC for updating and if required for resource mobilizing.

Procedure:

1. When an incident strikes R.O would declare as an emergency situation.
2. The heads of all Sections would reach the DEOC immediately.
3. The R.O will give directions to the department or authority regarding action to be taken.
4. The Information Assistant will call the Circle Officer concerned (in Incident area) and take status report of the incident and record in the concerned file.
5. The Circle Officer would by WT message, Email or by special messenger send signed copy of the report and also photographs on the incident if possible.
6. The Information Assistant will then prepare the incident report and submit to the In Charge, DEOC cum Addl. Deputy Commissioner, DDMA for approval.
7. The In Charge, DEOC would then place before R.O and get final approval for sending to SEOC.
8. The Information Assistant in coordination with the DPO,DDMA would perform the following duties:
 - The IA would join duty allotted and sign the attendance register.
 - Check the telephone connection whether it is functional or not.
 - Check any instruction received from the higher authority.
 - Check the television news for any information related to emergency or disaster situation.
 - Update the incident register (if any) and inform the higher concerned (ADC/DPO).
 - Update the call records and action taken.
 - Contact the concerned department for cross check and for reporting to higher Authority.
 - If required, coordinate with the departments for response and recovery.
 - Update the contact details of all department Heads, Staff etc. in the District.
 - Maintain list of vulnerable place, structures in the district. Also, map of district with the utilities mapped.
 - Update the departmental disaster management plans submitted by the departments.
 - Update the District disaster management plan.
 - Ensure the assets of DEOC are in good condition.
 - Ensure the register and files are maintained properly.

9.2 Managing flood relief camps in context of COVID-19 outbreak in Assam

Relief Camp Management Guidelines are included as Appendix-XXXV of the Assam Disaster Management Manual, 2015¹. In order to be better equipped to deal with flood situation vis-à-vis COVID-19 context, this document has been developed to serve as an addendum. This document will be used by all District Disaster Management Authority (DDMAs), SDO (Civil) and Revenue Circle Officers for management of Relief camps during ensuing flood season. (ASDMA) Major highlights of the addendum to existing Relief Camp Management Guideline are as follows:

- **Relief Camps and Accommodation capacity to be earmarked in advance:** Identify additional relief camps in addition to the existing pre-identify camps as per population density of villages to earmark space for social distancing. Ensure 7 Sq. m. of area per person instead of 3.5 Sq. m. to validate social distancing of at least one meter between any two camp inmates (calculation of intake Capacity of Relief Camps are given in the table next page).
- **Toilets facilities and the populations:** Sufficient Toilet facilities have to be provided in proportionate to the intake camp capacity. Coordinate with PHE Deptt. to ensure the same.
- **Ensure sufficient sanitation facility:** Ensure sufficient Hand-wash/soap, sanitizers, masks for the camp inmates. The Relief camp premises should be strictly notified as no-spitting, no-tobacco zone.
- **Medical Support & Health Surveillance Team:** Daily monitoring (in place of weekly) of health condition shall be done by the health team on duty in the camp following all precautions and guidelines. Medical team should be armored with basic PPE for conducting screening during registration process. Pre-identification of the Medical facilities like Ambulances for transportation of infected, isolation facilities nearby etc. In case of sneezing, cough, fever & common cold, immediate medical supervision to be made and he/she may be kept separately as per COVID-19 norms & regulations.
- **e-Help desk:** e-Help desk should be facilitated in all Operational Relief camps with the help of *Pratirodhi Bondhu* as counselor/ facilitator. These desks will emphasis on the facilities available on the e-help platform (e.g. Telemedicine, e-pashu etc.), a joint venture of ASDMA and CSC-SPV.
- **Pratirodhi Bondhu:** The Revenue Circle Administration may engage *Pratirodhi Bondhu* volunteers available in the revenue circle as per the guidelines.
- **SOP for relief/cooked food distribution in camps:** SoP should be prepared in collaboration with ASDMA for distribution of relief items/cooked food adhering precautionary measure as per COVID-19 norms & regulations.
- **Arrangement for fodder Livestock:** Pre-identify the highland areas e.g. tea gardens etc. with green grasses for arrangement of the green fodder for livestock of the farmers/ camp inmates.

- **Quarantine/isolation facility:** Quarantine/isolation facilities may be identified on higher altitudes by the district administration for transfer of COVID-19 suspected cases.

The detailed addenda to existing relief camp management guideline are comprehensively cited in the table below for managing flood relief camp vis-à-vis COVID-19:

- Special care should be taken/ SoP should be prepared for distribution of cooked food adhering to precautionary measure as per COVID-19 norms & regulations.
- Food items provided to young children should follow global Infant and young child recommendations, and remain in line with Infant Milk Substitute Act available at: <http://www.bpni.org/documents/IMS-act.pdf>
- Proper food hygiene should be maintained by cook whether cooking is done family wise or a community kitchen is established.
- Kitchen and food storage area should be sanitized thrice daily and camp inmates shall be sensitized in this regard by camp-incharge/ frontline workers on duty.
- Appropriate IECs on food safety shall be displayed in the cooking and dining area. The IECs are available at: <https://fssai.gov.in/cms/coronavirus.php>
- Pregnant women and lactating mothers at the camp should be provided relevant information on covid19, pregnancy, childbirth and breastfeeding.

Clothing:

- Appropriate arrangements shall be made for detergents and washing spaces for camp inmates to maintain cloth hygiene.
- Adequate provision of bed-nets shall be made.

Medical and Psychosocial Support:

- Medical team should be armored with basic PPE for conducting screening during registration process.
- Pre-identification of the Medical facilities like Medical team, Ambulances for transportation of infected, isolation facilities nearby etc.
- Home quarantine people to be shifted to quarantine centers and they shall not be kept in the relief camps.
- Daily monitoring (in place of weekly) of health condition shall be done by the health team on duty in the camp following all precautions and guidelines.
- Any suspected case shall be immediately shifted to designated health facility/ quarantine centre.
- All protocols for safety or camp inmates and staff on duty shall be strictly adhered to.
- All other guidelines in the relief camp management manual regarding medical and psychosocial support shall be implemented.
- Standby arrangements for transportation of symptomatic cases shall be made in all camps with more than 200 inmates (in place of 500)

9.5 SOP for Police during Natural Disaster

Police organisation has to see itself as a major player in disaster management. It will continue to have the first responder role given its proximity to the incident site and relationship with the people. Therefore it has to bring about change in its approach. It has to adopt disaster management function as a one of its primary functions. State & district level authorities cannot afford to wait for response specialized forces such as NDRF all the time. Moreover, on many occasions, it might not be advisable or feasible to obtain/deploy armed forces and NDRF. Hence state police must be prepared as response force.

The local police must be trained, equipped and supported with legislation and subsequently they can play supporting role to the specialist forces if and when they come in bigger emergency cases. On many occasions Special Forces are not required and the local police may retain the primary role to help the needy. The out side forces are also handicapped in operating in unknown area, among unknown people and here is the key to critical role of police. The Police are among the first responders in any crisis because,

- LOCAL POLICE ARRIVE FIRST
- POSSESS WELL DEVELOPED COMMUNICATION SYSTEM
- FAMILIAR WITH LOCAL TERRAIN
- WIDER REACH, EVERY VILLAGE COVERED
- BETTER KNOWLEDGE OF LOCAL PEOPLE FEELINGS AND MIND-SETS
- PEOPLE RECOGNISE POLICE AS FIRST RESPONDER UNIFORMED, DISCIPLINED

While functions of local police are well defined for internal emergency, same is not true for natural disasters. But wherever earthquake or flood occurs, the police get involved from beginning. Hence if their role is designed and documented in police manuals, disaster management acts and policies, it will, to that extent facilitate immediate effective response, at

least in the first few hours which are most crucial. Hence the need to frame SOPs that can help the police forces in being prepared and respond appropriately whenever any disaster happens.

Role of Police before disaster-Prevention and Preparedness phase Superintendent of Police of a district is ex-officio member of District Disaster Management Authority (DDMA) and in this capacity he could play important role in prevention and preparedness phase.

Emergency Traffic Plan:- Being familiar with the local terrain, Police should prepare emergency traffic plan including detail mapping with focus on strategic

points, which may be used at the time of incident for safe transporting of personnel, resources and relief goods to and from the affected area.

Detail communication Plan:- Police has a robust and effective Communication system that is also for non police functions. It can also be used to propagate information and warning of threatening disaster. Thus police can develop communication protocols for responding during disasters eg designate separate channels for rescue, relief for example. Chaukidars who are present at village level could play important role to collect sensitive information and disseminate emergency warning and other information.

Identification of Building:- PS personnel travel in their area frequently. They can be of great help in identifying buildings and campus which are easy to access and could be used as relief centres/relief camps and godown for storage of food grains and other rescue and relief materials.

Security Plan: - At the time of any serious incident it becomes inevitable to provide security to victims, responders and to relief materials at storage point and during transit. Resources deployed too may require security.

Resource Mapping: - It is very important to locate essential resources at very beginning of search and rescue works. In rescue and relief works even small and tiny elements become very important. So local police could identify, locate and document general essential elements useful for different kind of disasters. These resources may have to be operated under the guidance and protection of police.

Training:-Men in uniform (Police) are most visible and reliable government agency nearest to the people in difficult times. Police should conduct mock exercises with various stakeholders and should test and update their different plans.

Role of police during disaster-Emergency response phase

The primary role of police is evident during the management of the actual disaster situation. It includes:

(i) Search and Rescue (SAR):- The primary function during a disaster. Policemen must be

trained and equipped to begin rescue at the earliest to take relief to the victims till specialized forces arrive. During such activity, police has to provide protection to boats that are put in operation during floods. resources eg. Deployment of policeman on the boat plying in floods helps prevent overcrowding of boats and prevent capsizing. Such boats are provided with handheld wireless sets one to keep tracking its movements and provide help in disasters. To provide security to resources from unscrupulous elements.

(ii) Deployment of resources:- Police can help in deployment of resources, provide safety and security to the resources and the persons manning them. Restoration of communication system/liasoning with rescue teams:- Telephonic communication breaks down since the telephone towers/offices get destroyed with the result that landline and mobile phones stop working. Wireless communication might be the only means left. During floods or any other disaster most of the rescue teams operate in unknown territories under adverse conditions where landmarks are either washed away or destroyed. The army, navy and the NDRF has their own communication systems but it needed to be integrated with the district communication setup so that information of any emergency could be disseminated quickly and support reached at the earliest. Wireless communication need to be established on all the rescue boats and in operational camps. Make available police communication resources for other DM task eg. Relief distribution, medical teams.

(iii) Prevention of commission of cognizable offences including all offences against property, human body and public tranquility:- During disaster situation people abandon their houses with or without belongings. The safety and security of such houses and belonging is at risk. During such time people are without jobs hence incidence of crime generally increases. It also provides opportunities for the lumpen element such as robbers and thieves to commit cognizable offences

i.e. looting etc., against property. Similarly the vulnerable section of society particularly women and children susceptible to crimes against human body. Police can provide safety to such persons by active patrolling during disasters and by arresting the suspects beforehand.

(iv) Security during Relief distributions/ Relief management:- Relief distribution is an important aspect of disaster management. The designated relief distribution centre is generally located in the interiors. Therefore the security of personnel engaged in distribution and the material to be distributed (Cash and Kind) requires special attention. Similarly many bank branches get closed and therefore cash is sent from far of places for distribution as relief of maybe mobile ATMs will be used for people requiring cash. Police is required to provide security of the Cash and or ATMs. Likewise the security of grains and other relief material eg food packets being transported from different places to distribution centers is also important. Dedicated escorts are needed from the FCI godowns, railway stations to temporary storage/ distribution centers. The security of the food godowns, Railways stations where relief materials are received also require security. Relief material sent by NGOs etc. is also important and Police can play significant role in this regard. During the actual distribution of relief large numbers of people gather at the relief centre. The crowd management becomes important. The regulation of the process of distribution of relief can help in maintaining law and order.

(vi) Camp management:- Security of camp inmates, officials and volunteers engaged in running of camps including health workers is core function. During disaster the relief camps

would have people from many villages with different religious, political and caste backgrounds and thus has potential for friction. This requires deployment for law & order maintenance. Hundreds of government and non government employees/volunteers are engaged in running of kitchens, medical centers, sanitation units etc. They require protection all the time.

(vii) Emergency transportation and Traffic Regulation: Police has to facilitate the movement of rescue, medical, fire and other essential services. During disaster. Highways roads has to be kept free for movement of rescue teams and relief material. Check posts are to be established for ensuring safety of relief material. Road patrol has to be arranged for safe passage of army convoys, boats and other resources sent from outside. Control traffic during and after the incident and maintain access and egress routes Make available police resources to transport rescue and relief personnel and victims. Assist in managing huge logistical problems in handling relief supplies

(ix) Coordination with various agencies:- During disasters various agencies such as NDRF, SDRF, Paramilitary forces such as BSF, CRPF, CISF etc, Army, IAF, medical teams from outside the state arrive at the disaster sites. These external agencies are not informed about the physical terrain, Route Charts etc. The police can coordinate the activities of these agencies. The coordination among police and other agencies needs to be standardized in clear procedures.

(x) Casualty information/ Disposal of dead:- The identification of people involved in accidents/emergencies is a Police responsibility. All enquiries could be handled by police station staff. Tracing of missing persons and notification to their next of kin could be another area of work allotted to police. Disposal of dead bodies and documentation of dead and the missing for the benefit of next of kin to claim the compensation and ex-gratia.

(xii) Media management:- During any disaster situation information flow through the audio-visual as well as print media. The reports from need to be verified as soon as possible for quick response. The police can not only verify the facts of the information but also play an important role in briefing the media regarding the actual situation. This can help in checking the spread of rumours.

(xiii) VIP Security:- VIPs visit the affected area and relief camps frequently. Many a times, politically opposed/ dissatisfied resort to protests thereby posing threat to VIP and law and order. This must be handled by police.

(xiv) Crowd Management: Both at disaster site as well as at the relief distribution centre a large number of people gather as on lookers as well as the kith and kin of the victims. Sometimes the dissatisfied people disrupt the traffic road and rail. The police can play important role in management of the crowd.

Role of police After disaster-Restoration Face

(i) In long term operation of evacuation shelters the issues over the shelters would change and

if they are not addressed soon they would create law and order problem. Therefore it is important to find the causes of the problems as soon as possible, assess the situation and review the previous ways.

(ii) Accommodation of persons with special needs in evacuation shelters such as small children, pregnant women and mothers with nursing infants etc. requires utmost care. In a limited shelter space it is very important to provide special rooms for them. Police can play a very important role in this respect.

(iii) At the time of relief distribution and primary accommodation of victims support for the disabled and issues related to hygiene, infectious disease should be looked after carefully otherwise it creates serious problems to restoration.

(iv) Police can play an important role in selection of beneficiaries of houses and other assets to the victims to avoid complications and litigation.

(v) Restoration of Critical infrastructure:- Disaster usually affects the critical infrastructure such as road, telecommunication, health centers, school, electricity supply etc. Police can provide protection to the agencies which are involved in restoration of such infrastructure because people who are rendered jobless after disaster may hinder the process.

(vi) Safe exit of the personnel involved in disaster management:- After the disaster due to fatigue laxity might seep in to the system. Although the overall law and order situation is monitored and maintained by the police, it becomes very important after the disaster for the safe exit of the personnel from outside agencies involved in management of the disaster i.e. People from NGOs, INGOs, medical teams etc.

(vii) Feedback/assessment:- Since the police is the key factor in managing the disaster, their feedback/ assessment is very important in updating the plans for the future.

(viii) Contingency planning:- The police familiar with the local terrain and the resources available in the locality. They can plan the actions taken at the time of the disaster beforehand.

On hearing any warning or major industrial accident, general public should act as follows.

1. To go indoors immediately
2. Shut off all doors and windows, ventilators, block all entries points with wet cloth and curtain.
3. Swith off fans, exhaust fans,air conditioners.
4. Extinguish the flames in the nearby vicinity
5. Keep the torches handy and store water for emergency use.
6. Do not engage the emergency phone lines by calling emergency services unless any emergency.
7. Cover nose and mouth with wet cloth, and if outdoor move away quickly in the opposite direction of the wind to a safer place.
8. Wait for further instructions from emergency services before moving out.
9. Listen to warnings issued (Radio/TV)

**THE SPHERE PROJECT
HUMANITARIAN CHARTER AND
MINIMUM STANDARDS IN DISASTER RESPONSE**

The Charter, which is based on the principles and provisions of international humanitarian law, international human rights law, refugee law and code of conduct for the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement and Non Governmental Organisations in Disaster Relief. The Charter describes the core principles that govern humanitarian action and reasserts the right of populations affected by disaster, whether natural or man-made (including armed conflict), to protection and assistance. It also reasserts the right of disaster-affected populations to life and dignity.

WATER SUPPLY:

All people have safe and equitable access to a sufficient quantity of water for drinking, cooking, personal & domestic hygiene. Public water points are sufficiently close to households to enable use of the minimum water requirement.

- ❖ Average water use for drinking, cooking and personal hygiene in any household is atleast 15 litres per person per day.
- ❖ The maximum distance from any household to the nearest water point is 500 metres.
- ❖ Queuing time at a water source is no more than 15 minutes.
- ❖ It takes no more than three minutes to fill a 20-litre container.
- ❖ Water sources and systems are maintained such that appropriate quantities of water are available consistently or on a regular basis.
- ❖ All groups within the population have equitable access to the resources of facilities needed to continue or achieve the hygiene practices that are promoted.
- ❖ Users take responsibility for the management and maintenance of facilities as appropriate, and different groups contribute equitably.

EXCRETA DISPOSAL:

People have adequate numbers of toilets, sufficiently close to their dwellings, to allow them rapid, safe and acceptable access at all times of the day and night.

- ❖ A maximum of 20 people use each toilet.
- ❖ Use of toilets is arranged by household (s) and/or segregated by sex.
- ❖ Separate toilets for women and men are available in public places.
- ❖ Shared or public toilets are cleaned and maintained in such a way that all intended users use them.
- ❖ Toilets are no more than 50 metres from dwellings.
- ❖ Toilets are used in the most hygienic way and children"s faeces are disposed of immediately and hygienically.

VECTOR CONTROL:

All disaster-affected people need to have the knowledge and the means to protect themselves from disease and nuisance vectors that are likely to represent a significant risk to health or well-being.

- ❖ All populations at risk from vector-borne disease understand the modes of transmission and possible methods of prevention.
- ❖ All populations have access to shelters that do not harbour or encourage the growth of vector populations and are protected by appropriate vector control measures.
- ❖ People avoid exposure to mosquitoes during peak biting times by using all non-harmful means available to them. Special attention is paid to protection of high risk groups such as pregnant and feeding mothers, babies, infants, older people and the sick.
- ❖ People with treated mosquito nets use them effectively.
- ❖ Bedding and clothing are aired and washed regularly.
- ❖ Food is protected at all times from contamination by vectors such as flies, insects and rodents.

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT:

People have an environment that is acceptably uncontaminated by solid waste, including medical waste and have the means to dispose of their domestic waste conveniently and effectively.

- ❖ Household waste is put in containers daily for regular collection, burnt or buried in a specified refuse pit.
- ❖ All households have access to a refuse container and/or are no more than 100 metres from a communal refuse pit.
- ❖ At least one 100-litre refuse container is available per 10 families, where domestic refuse is not buried on-site.
- ❖ Refuse is removed from the settlement before it becomes a nuisance or a health risk.
- ❖ Medical wastes are separated and disposed of separately and there is a correctly designed, constructed and operated pit or incinerator with a deep ash pit, within the boundaries of each health facility.
- ❖ There are no contaminated or dangerous medical wastes (needles, glass, dressings, drugs etc) at any time in living areas or public spaces.
- ❖ Final disposal of solid waste is carried out in such a place and in such a way as to avoid creating health and environmental problems for the local and affected populations.

SHELTER AND SETTLEMENT:

Existing shelter and settlement solutions are prioritized through the return or hosting of disaster-affected households, and the security, health, safety and well-being of the affected populations are ensured.

- ❖ Affected households return to the site of their original dwellings where possible.
- ❖ Affected households who cannot return to the site of their original dwellings settle independently within a host community or with host families where possible.
- ❖ Affected households who cannot return to the site of their original dwellings or who cannot settle independently within a host community or with host families are accommodated in mass shelters or in temporary planned or self-settled camps.
- ❖ Actual or potential threats to the security of the affected population are assessed, and the dwellings or settlements are located at a safe distance from any such external threats.
- ❖ Risks from natural hazards including earthquake, volcanic activity, landslides, flooding or high winds are minimized and the area is not prone to diseases or significant vector risks.
- ❖ Locations are free of potentially hazardous equipment or material, and existing hazards such as dangerous structures, debris or unstable ground are identified and made safe or access is restricted and guarded.
- ❖ Land and property ownership and/or use rights for buildings or locations are established prior to occupation and permitted use is agreed as necessary.
- ❖ Water and sanitation services, and social facilities including health care, schools and places of worship, are available or can be satisfactorily provided.
- ❖ The transportation infrastructure provides access to the settlements for personal movement and the provision of services.
- ❖ Where possible, households can access land, markets or services for the continuation or development of livelihood support activities.

NON-FOOD ITEMS STANDARD:

- ❖ Each person has access to 250 gm of bathing soap per month.
- ❖ Each person has access to 200gm of laundry soap per month.
- ❖ Women and girls have sanitary materials for menstruation.
- ❖ Infants and children up to two years old have 12 washable nappies or diapers where these are typically used.
- ❖ Additional items essential for ensuring personal hygiene, dignity and well-being can be accessed.
- ❖ Each household has access to sustainable means of providing artificial lighting, e.g. lanterns or candles.
- ❖ Each household has access to matches or a suitable alternative means of lighting fuel or candles etc.
